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

Will of the Voters


- November 2012 ballot initiative passed with
 - 63 % of the vote
 - 349 of 351 cities and towns





Regulations: Public Process

- Public Hearings
 - 80+ attendees, 75+ testified
- Stakeholder Meetings
 - 25+ with patient advocates, industry experts, law enforcement, physicians, local officials, and more
- Written Comments
 - 197 diverse stakeholders
- Public Health Council
 - May 8, 2013






Certifying Physicians

- Mandatory physician training:
 - Minimum of 2.0 Category 1 CMEs about proper use of marijuana
- Must hold active MA license and have medical practice in MA
 - With no prescribing restriction
 - Must have a Massachusetts Controlled Substances Registration (MCSR)



Certifying Physicians



- Only a patient with a bona fide relationship with a physician, who has diagnosed the patient with a debilitating medical condition, is qualified for medical use of marijuana.
- To establish a bona fide relationship, physicians must:
 - Conduct clinical visit, complete and document medical history and current condition
 - Explain potential benefits and risks
 - Have role in the ongoing care and treatment of the patient



Debilitating Medical Condition

- Balance of promoting appropriate access but limiting inappropriate use
- Includes:
 - Cancer

ALS

Glaucoma

• Crohn's Disease

HIV, AIDS

Parkinson's Disease

Hepatitis C

- MS
- Other debilitating conditions determined by certifying physician



Pediatric Patients

A qualifying patient who is under 18 years of age

- Must be diagnosed by two MA licensed certifying physicians with a debilitating life-limiting illness
 - At least one physician must be a board-certified pediatrician or a board-certified pediatric subspecialist
- Can be certified for a debilitating medical condition if physicians determine that the benefits of the medical use of marijuana outweigh the risks and:
 - A discussion of potential negative impacts on neurological development with the parent or legal guardian of the qualifying patient
 - Written consent of the parent or legal guardian
 - Documentation of the rationale in the medical record and the written certification.



Patient Registration

Physicians:

- Look up patients in Prescription Monitoring Program
- Start a new record in MMJ Online System with patient background and debilitating medical condition information
- Complete certification, sign attestations, and submit electronic certification
- Provide copy of Patient registration number and instructional material to patient
- All steps conducted in physician's office
- Minors under the age of 18 have unique protocol





Patient Registration

- After physician submits electronic certification, patients must:
 - Register in MMJ Online System
 - Pay registration fee
 - Receive Program ID card
- Patients can designate personal caregiver
 - Caregiver also needs to register and receive Program ID card





Patient Certifications

- Certification can be valid for 15 days to 1 year
- 60 day supply presumed to be 10 ounces, but physician may certify for higher amount.





Personal Caregivers

- Assist qualifying patient
- Must be over the age of 21
- May only care for one qualifying patient
 - Except in cases of:
 - Employee of a hospice provider, nursing facility, medical facility
 - Visiting nurse
 - Home health aide
 - Personal care attendant
 - Immediate family member of more than one qualifying patient
- Qualifying patients may designate up to 2 personal caregivers
- May be reimbursed for expenses, but not paid for services





Hardship Cultivation

- Only permitted for those who qualify
- Requires DPH approval
- Must be at patient's or caregiver's primary residence
- Must be in enclosed, locked area that is not visible from the street or other public areas
- Limited to the necessary amount for patient's 60 day supply





Medical Use of Marijuana Program





Support Center

- MMJ Support Center Overview
 - 5 dedicated Support Center Coordinators, 1 Support Center Manager
 - Field 150-250 calls each day into the MMJ Program from various stakeholders (mostly patients)
 - 100 150 applications are processed daily in the MMJ Online System
- As of January 31, 2016 (Dashboard posted at mass.gov/medicalmarijuana)
 - 19,729 active patients
 - 1,064 active caregivers
 - 132 certifying physicians





Registered Marijuana Dispensaries

- Non-profit corporations
- Cultivate, process, and dispense marijuana
 - Edible Marijuana Infused Products (MIPs),
 Non-Edible MIPs, Dry Leaf, Oil
- Sell only to registered qualified patients & caregivers
- Must provide discounted marijuana to verified financial hardship patients
- Home delivery allowed





RMD Applications

Al Phase

Application of Intent

Since launch 6/29/15:

- 161 new RMD apps from 76 nonprofit corporations
- 148 applicants completed AI and invited to MOP Phase

MOP Phase

Management & Operations Profile

- 135 MOPs received from 66 nonprofit corporations
- 39 applicants completed MOP and invited to SP

SP Phase

Siting Profile

- 11 SP received from 8 nonprofit corporations
- ARL Healthcare (Norwood) has received a Provisional Certificate of Registration

RMDs Today

- 11 RMDs with a Provisional Certificate of Registration
 - In the Inspection Phase (build out)
- 6 RMDs are now Open and Selling Product
 - Alternative Therapies, Inc. (Salem)
 - In Good Health, Inc. (Brockton)
 - Central Ave Compassionate Center, Inc. (Ayer)
 - New England Treatment Access, Inc. (Northampton)

What does Massachusetts DPH test for?


- Microbiological screen
- Heavy metals screen
 - Arsenic, Cadmium, Lead, Mercury
- Mycotoxin screen
- Cannabinoid Profile
- Residual solvents
- Environmental media testing
